OPEN MEETING NOTICE TO DISCUSS PROPERTY TAX ADJUSTMENT TARIFF SCHEDULE 24-PTA

The Wheatland Electric Cooperative, Inc. Board of Trustees will meet on FEB. 25, 2025, AT 9 A.M. CST at the Wheatland Electric office, 200 10th St., Great Bend, Kansas. During the meeting, the WEC Board of Trustees and management will discuss and vote on a proposed rate change in its Property Tax Adjustment tariff Schedule 24-PTA. The change would be to align the rate retail members pay with the rates, per kWh usage, paid by wholesale customers utilizing Wheatland's sub-transmission facilities. This change is intended to ensure fairness and equity for all customers and members of Wheatland Electric Cooperative, Inc. The portion of the meeting where rates are discussed and voted on is open to all members. Wheatland members are advised that any member has a right to receive customer information and request that the Kansas Corporation Commission review the rate changes pursuant to K.S.A. 66-104d(g).

Trustee Elections Will Be Held by Mail This March

Three board seats open for election

Members of Wheatland Electric Cooperative, Inc., will receive trustee election ballots by mail in late March.

Ballots will be mailed March 24, 2025, and must be returned by April 18, 2025, which is at least five days prior to this year's annual meeting, according to WEC's bylaws. WEC's 2025 annual meeting will be held on April 23, 2025, in Scott City, Kansas.

The primary meeting in Scott City will be livestreamed to seven additional remote meeting locations: Leoti, Tribune, Syracuse, Garden City, Great Bend, Harper and Caldwell.

Members across our service territory are encouraged to attend any of these meeting locations to hear cooperative news and updates, enjoy a meal, ask questions, enter for door prizes, and more. For more information on this year's annual meeting, see Page 12C.

For the second year in a row, WEC's

mail-in voting will be conducted and managed by Survey and Ballot Systems, a national data solutions company based in Eden Prairie, Minnesota, as a trusted third-party provider. Trustees selected the reputable firm to ensure a transparent, effective and fair election process.

- DISTRICT 7 (Harper, Kingman, Sumner and Sedgwick counties in Kansas)


WEC'S BYLAWS ALLOW FOR TWO METHODS FOR TRUSTEE NOMINATIONS



HONORING COURAGE & COMMUNITY: Parker, Shelton, West

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WHEATLAND WARRIOR

At Wheatland Electric, ensuring a positive safety culture is at the core of

everything we do. We foster this culture through rigorous training, open communication, and a shared commitment to protecting the well-being of our employees, our cooperative members, and our communities. By prioritizing safety in every decision, we aim to create an environment where everyone feels empowered to look out for one another and act with courage when it matters most.

At our annual Safety Summit held in Great Bend this past December, WEC leadership proudly introduced a new accolade — the **WHEATLAND WARRIOR AWARD** — to honor the selfless actions and unwavering courage of individuals who exemplify our guiding principle of Concern for Community and reinforce our positive safety culture. This award has been established to

recognize employees who go above and beyond, embodying courage, compassion and selflessness in moments of crisis or need.

Whether responding to emergencies on the job or in their personal lives, these individuals exemplify what it means to care for others and to live out the cooperative spirit. The term "warrior" reflects the bravery and determination required to step up and make a difference, often inspiring others to do the same.

A LIFE SAVED THROUGH SWIFT ACTION

On what began as an ordinary day at WEC's Garden City office on June 4, 2024, **LUKE WEST'S** quick thinking and leadership turned a potential tragedy into a story of hope.

At approximately 10:15 a.m., a distress call alerted employees to an individual pinned under a vehicle in the parking lot. Without hesitation, West, director of corporate services and water, retrieved critical safety equipment, including an automated external defibrillator (AED) and a bloodborne pathogen kit, before rushing to the scene outside.

Working alongside other employees, West helped secure a jack to lift the vehicle and free the unresponsive individual. Understanding the urgency of the matter, he began administering CPR, providing lifesaving compressions and breaths while applying AED pads. As emergency personnel arrived on the scene, the individual began breathing again, thanks to the decisive actions of West, and other WEC employees who responded to the incident.



Following the incident, local emergency responders commended WEC employees for their effective response, noting how rare it is to see bystanders act with such precision during high-stress situations. We believe West's bravery and leadership in this life-threatening emergency embody the very essence of a Wheatland Warrior.

HEROES ON THE BACKROADS

In June 2024, **CLAY SHELTON**, line foreman, and **ADAM PARKER**,

journeyman lineman, who both serve as local volunteer firefighters, faced an unimaginable tragedy on the dirt roads of Harper County. A 23-year-old driver lost control of her vehicle, which rolled several times before ejecting her into a nearby field. As they approached the scene, Shelton and Parker immediately stopped to help.

Amid the wreckage, they discovered an even more urgent situation: a onemonth-old infant trapped upside down inside the crushed vehicle. Crawling through the back window, Clay freed the infant and ensured the child's safety. The two men then turned their attention to the driver, providing assistance until emergency personnel arrived.

Though the day ended in heartbreak with the young mother's passing, we believe the actions of Shelton and Parker exemplify the courage and compassion of Wheatland Warriors. Their decisive response and willingness to step up in the face of adversity underscore their deep commitment to their community and their cooperative.

A LEGACY OF CARE AND COURAGE

The inaugural presentation of the Wheatland Warrior award serves as a powerful reminder of the extraordinary acts of service and bravery that have taken place within our cooperative family. We believe Parker, Shelton and West have set an inspiring standard, demonstrating that our commitment to community extends far beyond the electricity we provide.

"These stories remind us of what it truly means to be a part of Wheatland Electric," said Bruce W. Mueller, CEO/ general manager. "It's about looking out for one another, stepping up when it matters most, and embodying the values that make us more than just a workplace. We are a community."

As we continue to prioritize safety and service, the Wheatland Warrior award will remain a beacon of recognition for those who embody the cooperative spirit. We hope these stories inspire all of us to be warriors for safety, service and one another.

ECONOMIES OF SCALE. Johnson Corner is a 20-megawatt facility and about 2,000 times larger than a typical residential rooftop solar installation. The utility-scale size of Johnson Corner provides a significantly lower price for solar energy compared to solar energy from rooftop installations because systems like ours have the advantage of economies of scale, meaning that costs decrease as the size of the system increases.

MAXIMIZE SUN EXPOSURE. The Johnson Corner solar project also has tracking motors that adjust the angle of the solar panels throughout the day to maintain maximum exposure to the sun. This provides maximum utilization of solar irradiance with no impact due to shading from trees or adjacent buildings.

TRANSFER SERVICE. If a subscriber moves to a new house within our service territory, their subscription may transfer to their new service. The subscription may need to be adjusted based upon the past year's electricity usage of their new home.

MINIMAL RISK. If the program does not provide the benefits desired by the member, they may leave the program at any time.

100% RENEWABLE. Solar power is a clean energy solution, promoting the health of the planet.
