\$110,287 in Donations Raised for 12 Food Banks

Thanks to the combined efforts of our members, businesses and community partners, the 2024 Power the Pantry campaign raised an incredible \$110,287 IN CASH AND FOOD **DONATIONS** for a dozen local food banks. Over the past decade, WEC has facilitated the collection of nearly 214 TONS OF FOOD DONATIONS — an astounding 427,980 POUNDS (\$1 = 1 pound)!

Every fall since 2014, Wheatland Electric has rallied communities across southwest and central Kansas to support local food banks through CRAM THE VAN, an annual food drive featuring community gatherings, school competitions and collection events. The program was named for its signature red passenger van, which played a prominent role transporting donations to food banks across WEC's service territory. In 2023, WEC shifted our efforts (and retired our van) to better meet the needs of community food banks by launching the Power the Pantry initiative, and PLEDGING \$50,000 annually.

In 2024, we worked to **DOUBLE THE IMPACT** of our cash donation, with a goal of raising \$100,000 for the food banks serving as a safety net across the communities we serve.

Through an online fundraising campaign where donors were entered to win Chiefs/Broncos tickets, monetary donations from co-op members across our seven districts, a friendly school competition in Great Bend, a food drive partnership with students in Conway Springs, and our sixth annual Coops Care Charity Golf Tournament (held Sept. 6, 2024), we exceeded our \$100,000 goal and RAISED A TOTAL OF \$110,287!

As our campaign and the outpouring from our communities has grown, our focus has shifted to maximizing our impact through **CASH DONATIONS**, which are preferable These monetary donations were delivered to the following food banks just before Thanksgiving:

to food items as they eliminate waste, reduce storage needs, and offer flexibility by allowing food banks to purchase perishable items such as meat and cheese, and provide vouchers to food bank patrons to use at local groceries.

In addition to the monetary donations, food items from our Great Bend Schools Competition sponsored by Gifting Forward (7,365 pounds) and Cardinals Care Challenge in Conway Springs (1,517 items) were delivered to area food banks. We also extend a special thanks to TYSON FRESH MEATS, which generously contributed \$17,500 worth of honey deli ham, providing high-quality, protein-rich meat for distribution to families in need.

"We are thrilled to share that this year's Power the Pantry campaign not only met but surpassed our goal, enabling us to make a meaningful difference for our local food banks," shared Alli Conine, director of member services and corporate communications. "This success reflects the incredible generosity and unwavering support of our members, and we extend our heartfelt thanks to everyone who helped make this contribution possible."

Great Bend Schools Win Cash Prizes in Cram the Van Competition

GREAT BEND SCHOOLS

joined forces with Wheatland Electric's annual Cram the Van food drive to collect



nearly 5 tons in cash and food donations (\$1 = 1 pound) to benefit the **COMMUNITY FOOD BANK OF BARTON COUNTY.** Students from 12 area schools participated in a friendly food drive competition, collecting the equivalent of **9,661 POUNDS** during November's competition.

Through the generosity of **GIFTING FORWARD**, a charitable foundation in Great Bend, \$1,500 in cash prizes were awarded to the top four schools based on the highest per-student contribution, recognizing the dedication of students who made an exceptional impact. All donations were delivered to the Community Food Bank of Barton County in Great Bend, ensuring vital support reaches local families just in time for the Thanksgiving and Christmas season.

With this year's contribution, the 10-year total collected through Cram the Van in Great Bend has reached an incredible 92,327 pounds — more than 46 tons of cash and non-perishable food items donated since the program's inception in 2014.

"This event empowers our local students to make a difference by supporting those in need, while teaching them the meaningful impact of small acts of kindness," said Alli Conine, director of member services and corporate communication for Wheatland Electric. "Through their efforts, they experience how every contribution, no matter the size, can profoundly affect the lives of others. All of this is made possible through the continued generosity and support of Gifting Forward."

LINCOLN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL celebrated a first-place victory in WEC's Cram the Van Schools Competition, collecting 15.06 pounds of food per student! Their efforts were rewarded with a \$600 cash prize from Gifting Forward.

CENTRAL KANSAS CHRISTIAN ACADEMY earned an impressive second-place finish, collecting 14.27 pounds of food per student and received a \$400 cash prize from Gifting Forward.

HOLY FAMILY SCHOOL proudly claimed third place, collecting an impressive 8 pounds of food per student! Their efforts earned a \$250 cash prize provided by Gifting Forward.

JEFFERSON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL secured fourth place in WEC's Cram the Van Schools Competition, collecting 6.98 pounds of food per student earning a \$250 cash prize sponsored by Gifting Forward.

Our subscription-based program allows residential members (homeowners or renters) to subscribe to shares equivalent to 125 kilowatt hours or two solar panels — and receive an adjustment on their monthly bill.

As a solar subscriber, there's no change to your electric service. The only difference is that the energy generated on your behalf will be 100% RENEWABLE. It's a win-win for your wallet and the planet!



You will receive a solar adjustment on your solar shares on your electric bill, which is based on the revenues derived from the power sold into the energy market.

*Shares are limited to no more than the average of your previous 12-month electric use. If your 12-month average = 1,000 kWh, then a max of 8 shares is allowed.

Your rate will automatically drop to \$4 per share beginning with your January billing.

HOW DO I SIGN-UP?

- ▶ Wheatland Electric members can subscribe on a first-come. first-served basis.
- New subscriptions will see a two-month bill delay.
- Contact your local office to calculate your allowed number of solar shares based on your 12-month average electric consumption.
- ▶ Members interested in participating can sign up by completing the WHEATLAND COMMUNITY SOLAR SHARE AGREEMENT.
