SAFET Tip of the Month

Lawn mowers and gardening tools, like weed whackers, can be dangerous. Children should never be allowed to play anywhere near mowers. Objects hidden in the grass, such as rocks or metal wire fragments, can become dangerous projectiles, striking the body or eye. Wear protective eyewear and turn the mower completely off before clearing grass from the lawn mower.

Check This Month's Bill to See Your Capital Credits Retirement

We are retiring in Capital Credits in August 2020



Due to COVID-19 and the economic impact it had for some of our members, the Wheatland Board of Trustees wanted to assist the membership by retiring capital credits early.

Barring any unforeseen circumstances, Wheatland will retire additional capital credits in December 2020.

HOW CAPITAL CREDITS WORK

When a person establishes service with us, they become a member and are eligible for capital credits.

Capital credits represent a member's share of the co-op's margins during the time they have membership. Capital credits are earned by every member based on the amount of electricity they use.

At the end of the fiscal year, any funds (margins) remaining after expenses have been paid are allocated to the member's account.

The allocated funds are used as operating capital for system improvements and maintenance.

Every year, the board evaluates the financial condition of the co-op to determine if it can retire capital credits.

When the board decides to retire capital credits, we calculate the amount owed to each member.

Current members who received electricity during the time period being retired will receive a percentage of capital credits retirements via a bill credit or check.


Former members who received electricity during the time period being retired will be mailed a check if it is more than \$20.

An **ALLOCATION** is made annually for each member, based on the amount of electricity purchased. An allocation is the member's share of the net margins. The co-op sets this money aside to be used as operating capital for improvements and maintenance over a period of years.

A **RETIREMENT** is the amount a member receives as a payout. It is a portion of the total allocation. The amount paid is decided annually by the board of trustees based on the financial condition of the co-op.
